Nicolas Sperandeo (Theatre and Dance) - A junior earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts in musical theatre, Sperandeo has secured leading roles in multiple productions while contributing to the department's social media team and recruitment efforts.

GOVS CREATIVE ARTS FESTIVAL

In partnership with the Center of Excellence for Creative Arts and the Community School of the Arts, we hosted our inaugural Govs Creative Arts Festival at the Clarksville Downtown Commons on Sept. 14, 2024, bringing arts education and entertainment to the Clarksville community! The festival, made possible through a \$15,000 Google Data Center Grant awarded to APSU's Community School of the Arts, showcased our commitment to accessible arts experiences. We offered free activities including live performances, painting classes, printmaking experiences, and an instrument petting zoo. APSU students and faculty presented opera, musical theatre, and spoken word productions, while interactive stations allowed community members to engage with various art forms!





CHRISTMAS EVENTS (HAPPEAY HOLIDAYS & WHITE CHRISTMAS)

The Department of Music launched its first HapPEAY Holidays Showcase, establishing a new seasonal tradition at Austin Peay State University! The festive concert featured 14 of the university's premier musical ensembles performing holiday classics in the Mabry Concert Hall. The event demonstrated APSU's commitment to community engagement by offering admission in exchange for pantry donations to the S.O.S. Food Pantry, while encouraging audience participation through holiday attire and closing singalongs. The production, directed by Victoria Matlock Fowler, showcased student talent through spectacular dance numbers.

Since 1985, the Center of Excellence for the Creative Arts (CECA) has been providing students, the Clarksville community, and the Middle Tennessee region with engaging experiences through the Art + Design, Creative Writing, Music, and Theatre and Dance programs at APSU. CECA supports students, faculty, and the regional community by providing enriching educational and artistic experiences, and by hosting emerging, nationally and internationally recognized artists.

During the 2024-25 academic year, CECA sponsored 103 distinct events— some of them encompassing multiple activities, repeat performances, and several days. A vast majority of these events included guest artists going beyond lecture or performance, offering workshops, discussions, lessons, and masterclasses to hundreds of APSU students, faculty, staff, and regional community members. Total attendance at CECA-sponsored programming and events during the 2024-25 academic year exceeded 13,500 people.

Google Grant & Tennessee Arts Commission Grant

This year, CECA received a \$10,000 Google grant to support initiatives that improve accessibility in the arts, ensuring that individuals with different abilities have equitable access to creative spaces, programming, and participation. The goal is to foster a more inclusive arts community where all individuals can engage fully as artists, audiences, and participants.

Additionally, CECA received \$9,300 from the Tennessee Arts Commission to help facilitate the loan of sculptures, including those by Tennessee-based artists, to be on display in the Arts Quad, located on the Austin Peay campus on the corner of Henry Street.



Established in 1990, the Community School of the Arts (CSA) at APSU offers a variety of arts classes for children and adults, from beginning to advanced levels, in the areas of dance, theatre, music, creative writing, and visual art. In addition to arts courses offered throughout the academic year, the CSA also hosts two weeks of summer arts camps for children ages 8-15.

The CSA is managed by the Center of Excellence for the Creative Arts at Austin Peay. This year, the organization offered 63 classes, 14 workshops, and three youth programs, serving 1,052 students.

Google Grant

In 2025, the CSA received a \$21,500 Google Tides Grant to continue creating accessible arts experiences, focusing on three main projects and partnering with community organizations. The first partnership began with the Customs House Museum & Cultural Center and will continue offering free monthly adult painting classes. These classes, which require registration due to high demand, are held at the museum, with CSA providing the instructor and supplies. The second partnership started in Fall 2024 with the Clarksville- Montgomery County School System and provides free after-school arts classes in low-income schools. The final partnership includes a collaboration with the College of Arts & Letters, the Center of Excellence for the Creative Arts, and Montgomery County Parks and Recreation to organize and host a free community event at

the Downtown Commons the Govs Creative Arts Festival. In 2024, this event featured live performances by APSU faculty, students, and alumni, along with arts activities. The second Govs Creative Arts Festival was hosted in September 2025.





The Institute for Public Humanities (IPH) continued its community engagement through several key initiatives in the 2024-25 academic year. On Oct. 29, 2024, IPH hosted "20th Century Humanities in Clarksville" at the Customs House Museum and Cultural Center, featuring a panel discussion about influential local artists and writers. Moderated by Dr. Linda Crenshaw, the event explored the legacies of Tom Malone, Peg Harvill, and Tom Mabry through conversations with family members Charlsie Halliburton, Kitty Harvill, and Lawson Mabry. Throughout the year, IPH also produced its "Humanscape of Clarksville Podcast," exploring the impact of the humanities on everyday life.

Araan Schmidt's Cracked Earth installed on Arts Quad

The Department of Art + Design, in collaboration with the Center of Excellence for the Creative Arts and the College of STEM, marked a significant milestone with the installation of *Cracked Earth* by sculptor Araan Schmidt on the Arts Quad. This outdoor public sculpture, the first installation since 2018, represents the beginning of an initiative to transform the campus into a public sculpture park.



Arts and Letters student earns top scholarship to Princeton Theological Seminary

Sara Lusk, a recent graduate with a double major in philosophy and classics, earned a prestigious scholarship to Princeton Theological Seminary. An active campus leader who served as Sigma Kappa Sorority president and participated in multiple honor societies, Lusk plans to pursue graduate studies in women's ministry and world religion at one of the oldest and most distinguished seminaries in the United States.



Breaking New Ground in Sports Broadcasting

APSU sports communication students produced live broadcasts for the inaugural season of Govs Hockey Club at the Ford Ice Center, marking a new partnership between the university and Nashville hockey. The initiative, which included mentorship from Nashville Predators' announcer Pete Weber, prepared students for the growing hockey market in Clarksville.



Folk Music Meets Rap at F&M Bank Arena

APSU's student folk ensemble Fiddlin' Peayple won first place in the Battle @ Browning competition, earning them the opportunity to open for platinum-selling rapper Moneybagg Yo at F&M Bank Arena. The ensemble captivated thousands with their unique folk arrangements of popular songs at the inaugural Peayple's Concert.

After returning to APSU's Department of Theatre and Dance, she excelled academically while earning multiple scholarships and certifications, including stage combat training in six weapons forms. Her dedication and talent earned her acceptance to London's Rose Bruford College, where she will pursue a Master of Fine Arts in acting. NEW ENDOWMENTS

Joe W. Giles Endowed Fund of Excellence

Supports the College of Arts and Letters, Department of Music, and the Center of Excellence for the Creative Arts (CECA). Funds student scholarships, faculty support, research, conference travel, equipment needs, and CECA programming. Established by Joe W. Giles, a nationally recognized leader in arts education and founder of the Tennessee Arts Academy.

Dr. Sara Gotcher Theatre and Dance & Dr. Mike Gotcher Communication Distinguished Professorships

Two distinguished professorships supporting student-centric initiatives in the Department of Theatre and Dance and the Department of Communication. Funds faculty-driven projects, student development, equipment purchases, travel, research, and scholarships to enhance departmental growth and student success.

Betty Joe Wallace Lectureship Endowment

Honors Professor Betty Joe Wallace's legacy through lectures focusing on American history, African American history, and women's history. Endowed in 2024 by John Chapman, supporting speaker expenses and programming. Wallace was instrumental in developing APSU's African American studies and women's studies programs.

Marcus Hayes Theatre and Dance Endowed Scholarship

Supports theatre and dance majors/minors, with consideration for other arts programs. Open to all class levels, renewable based on criteria, with emphasis on student talent and experience.

Music Heals: Henry Rives Memorial Endowed Scholarship

Established in memory of Henry Knox Rives, this scholarship supports students pursuing music therapy or music education. Honors Rives' legacy as a beloved musician and APSU alumnus who impacted the Clarksville/Nashville community.

Morris Stevens Memorial Music Scholarship

Prioritizes Montgomery Central High School graduates pursuing music studies, with expanded eligibility for CMCSS graduates and other incoming music students. Recipients must demonstrate financial need.

Rosemary K. Norris Dance Scholarship Endowment

Established by Mandy Norris Smith in honor of her mother, a prominent Clarksville dance instructor. Supports incoming freshman dance majors showing exceptional talent and motivation in dance activities.







We had another great year at the Be A Gov! Tour, visiting six major Tennessee cities in Spring 2025! These events featured President Mike Licari and university leaders meeting directly with prospective students and their families. Arts and Letters alumna Celeste Malone shared her APSU experience with future Governors. The tour, which included stops in Antioch, Murfreesboro, Chattanooga, Memphis, Gallatin, and Bellevue, highlighted APSU's academic programs while awarding scholarships and prizes to future Governors!

The university also hosted Get Ready to Gov, an on-campus experience for high school underclassmen. This program allowed prospective students to explore academic programs across all colleges, engage with faculty and current students, tour facilities including residence halls, and learn about campus life and organizations.
