




Fall Enrollment by FTE Five-Year Trend





Spring Enrollment by FTE Five-Year Trend




Fall Enrollment Trends by Level




Spring Enrollment Trends by Level





Fall Student Enrollment by Tuition Rate




Fall International Student Enrollment





Tennessee County Enrollment Map




Tennessee Counties Five-Year Fall Enrollment Trends



Freshman Enrollment












Retention Rates by Housing



Retention Rates by Traditional vs Non-Traditional Students




Four-Year and Six-Year Graduation Rates








Military-Affiliated Student Fall Enrollment








Fall Dual Enrollment

Credit Hours: Attempted vs Earned Five-Year Trend








Five-Year Degree Trends by College





Top Ten Popular Undergraduate Degrees Awarded








