### —Biographies—

Hailing from Smyrna, Tennessee, **Emily Sholar** credits her middle school band director with her introduction to the horn. He presented it as an advancement from the trumpet, her original instrument of choice, and she never looked back. Emily began her studies with Belmont University's horn professor, Tara Johnson, at age twelve and remained under her instruction for six years. Now in her third year of study at APSU with Dr. Kristen Sienkiewicz, Emily is pursuing a Bachelor of Music degree with a concentration in Instrumental Performance. She can be heard with APSU's Symphony Orchestra, Wind Ensemble, Horn Choir, and her brass quintet, AurumSonor. In addition, her Junior Recital will take place at 5:30 on Wednesday, March 20. Emily is the grateful recipient of the Marlon and Linda Crow Music Endowment Scholarship and the Edington Family Scholarship in Music. Upon graduation, she looks forward to pursuing a graduate study of horn performance somewhere warm.

Jackson Howard is a violist in his fourth year at Austin Peay State University. His musical journey began in the 5th grade where, when given the choice to be in band, orchestra, or choir, he chose band, in which he played trumpet. After only a few months of beginning band Jackson, and his family moved from Maryland to Alabama and was unable to continue in band until the 7th grade. In the interim, he was able to continue teaching himself the basics of reading music and trumpet playing. It wasn't until he was in the 8th grade that Jackson developed an interest in stringed instruments and asked his parents for a violin. He was an entirely self-taught violinist until he made the switch to viola in his senior year of high school, at which point he began private instruction in preparation for his college auditions. While studying music education at APSU, Jackson has been an active member of C-NAfME (Collegiate-National Association for Music Education) and has volunteered regularly with the Clarksville Youth Orchestra. He has been seen performing with APSU's Symphonic Band (Trumpet), Wind Ensemble (Trumpet), and Symphony Orchestra (Viola). Outside of APSU, Jackson has also had the privilege to sing with the Gateway Chorale in performances of Mahler's Symphony No.2 and Osvaldo Goliov's 'La Pasión según San Marcos'. He was also selected to attend the Sewanee Summer Music Festival in 2023, where he spent a month studying privately with renowned violists and performing major works of orchestral and chamber music. Following his graduation in May, Jackson intends to begin his pursuit of a MM degree in viola performance. After completion of his MM, he plans to teach secondary, instrumental music while remaining an active performer.
