ARTIST PROFILES

WARREN WOLF

Warren Wolf has established himself as the foremost straight-ahead vibraphonist of his generation, a bop torchbearer well equipped to carry the mantle of forebears like Bobby Hutcherson and Milt Jackson.

A native of Baltimore, MD, the multi-instrumentalist began his musical studies at the age of three. Wolf trained on the vibraphone, marimba, drums, and piano, developing a deep background in all genres of music. Under the guidance of his father, Warren studied classical composers from Bach to Shostakovich and also studied ragtime music from the songbooks of Scott Joplin, Harry Brewer, and George Hamilton Green. In jazz, Warren studied the works of Charlie Parker, Miles Davis, Duke Ellington, Louis Armstrong, Freddie Hubbard, Clifford Brown, Herbie Hancock, Oscar Peterson, Milt Jackson, Bobby Hutcherson, Cal Tjader, Return to Forever, Weather Report, and Wynton Marsalis.

After graduating from the Baltimore School for the Arts and the Berklee College of Music, Warren Wolf became an active performing artist. In his latest album, Wolf reveals an entirely different side of his multi-faceted talents. As its title implies, *Reincarnation* represents a rebirth of sorts for the Baltimore vibesman, including tracks that free Wolf to indulge his love for the R&B and soul hits that served as the soundtrack to his formative years.

ALEX BROWN

Grammy Award-winning pianist and composer Alex Brown is at the forefront of a new generation of artists. The *New York Times* says he plays "with a crystalline touch and a worldly approach." Brown frequently performs with his own group, and *Downbeat Magazine* described his 2010 album *Pianist* as "a really fine record that leaves you wanting more." In 2021, he released his second album as a leader, *The Dark Fire Sessions*. Brown has been a member of Paquito D'Rivera's ensemble since 2007, performing on and contributing arrangements to their Latin GRAMMY award-winning album *Jazz Meets the Classics*. Brown collaborates frequently with artists that include Warren Wolf, Sean Jones, Christian McBride, Imani Winds, Harlem Quartet, Miho Hazama, Cho-Liang Lin, David Shifrin, and he has performed with Chris Thile on the American variety show *Live From Here* (formerly known as *Prairie Home Companion*).

BLAKE MEISTER

A provocative young musician and composer, bassist Blake Meister has worked with a range of virtuoso performers including Gary Thomas, Larry Willis, Katharine McPhee, Louis Hayes, Jack DeJohnette, Ahn Sook Sun, Ralph Peterson, Ingrid Jensen, Warren Wolf, Jeremy Pelt, Sean Jones, Jeff "Tain" Watts, Dennis Chambers, Marc Copland, and Victor Lewis.

Touring and recording with Larry Willis in his Heavy Blue band, Blake developed in the modern jazz tradition. He appears on Willis' final outing, *I Fall in Love Too Easily*, on HighNote records. Blake honed his style and musical dialect working regularly with Gary Thomas, including Thomas' large ensemble, Pariah's Pariahs. He appears on Thomas' album *At Risk*, on Inner Circle Music, for which he also wrote the liner notes.

Blake also released *Septagon* on Inner Circle. The album marked his debut as a leader and is critically acclaimed: *Septagon* was named Album of the Year by both *CapitalBop* and the *Washington City Paper*.

QUINCY PHILLIPS

Quincy Phillips is a drummer, pianist, and organist at his home church, East Baltimore Deliverance. He holds the B.A. in Music from Howard University in Washington, D.C.

Phillips had the great honor to perform for the President of the United States Barack Obama and First Lady Michelle Obama in the "Smithsonian Salutes Ray Charles: In Performance at the White House" celebration. The evening included performances by the Christian McBride Big Band, Yolanda Adams, Leon Bridges, Andra Day, Anthony Hamilton, Demi Lovato, Sam Moore, and The Band Perry, with Rickey Minor as executive music director.

Phillips won first place for Jazz Composition for his arrangement of "Alone Together" at the International Association of Jazz Educators conference in New York City and is a member of the GRAMMY-award winning Christian McBride Big Band.

DAVID E. STEINQUEST

For thirty-eight years, David E. Steinquest has served as Director of the Mid-South Jazz Festival and as professor of percussion at Austin Peay State University. He completes his teaching career at Austin Peay this spring. Professor Steinquest is perhaps best known locally as the percussion teacher in APSU's Department of Music and as the leader of the zany, always fresh, always soldout annual APSU Percussion Ensemble Halloween Concert. He is also a gifted, versatile musician, author, and arranger who performs in ensembles ranging from the Nashville Symphony to the Clarksville Jazz Quintet.

David takes justifiable pride in being able to teach any student at any level and once remarked that he "never worked a day in his life" (not true) because he enjoyed teaching so much, and because it involved so much playing (playing music). Intimately involved in training the Governor's Own Marching Band drum line each fall, David Steinquest also led the University's Jazz Combo for many years. Admission to David's iconic Halloween Percussion Ensemble Concert and the equally popular Christmas with David Steinquest and Friends event has long been available in exchange for a donation of non-perishable food (or cash). This process has resulted in the collection of literally tons of food provided to hungry persons in our community through local food banks.

The recipient of Austin Peay's 2016 Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Faculty Award for Community Service, Steinquest holds a Bachelor of Music Education from Northeast Louisiana University and the Master of Music in Percussion Performance from the University of Michigan. In earlier years, David Steinquest served on the faculties of Albion College, the University of Arkansas, and the National Music Camp at Interlochen. He was also a member of the United States Military Academy Band at West Point. He has recorded for Row-Loff Productions, Arrangers Publishing Company, and the Nashville String Machine. He endorses Majestic Percussion Instruments and Innovative Percussion sticks and mallets.

We join the community in wishing David Steinquest many happy, healthy years ahead as he explores new adventures.

The Mid-South Jazz Festival began in 1961 under the direction of Aaron Schmidt. During its early decades, it featured the APSU Jazz Collegians, big bands from Ft. Campbell and regional high schools and universities, and an occasional professional ensemble. Artists featured with the Jazz Collegians included luminaries such as Buddy Baker, Louis Bellson, Carl Fontana, Urbie Green, Don Jacoby, Rich Matteson, Dominic Spera, Clark Terry, and Phil Wilson.

IN MEMORIAM

ANNE DAVIS GLASS, 1938-2024

Elizabeth Anne Davis Glass was a steadfast supporter, donor, subscriber, and member of the Board of Directors of the Clarksville Community Concert Association for six decades. Arriving in Clarksville in 1962, she soon became a member of the Clarksville Community Concert Association, a beloved piano teacher, and a highly respected, skilled piano accompanist for local choirs, instrumentalists, and singers.

Equipped with a Bachelor's degree in piano performance from Stetson University (DeLand, FL), Anne completed a Master's degree in piano performance at George Peabody College (now part of Vanderbilt University) on scholarship after moving to Tennessee. Versatility at the keyboard was Anne Glass's specialty and kept her in great demand. Ms. Glass served as Trinity Episcopal Church's organist from the early 1960s until the end of her life. Anne retired from the Austin Peay State University Department of Music faculty in 2019 at the rank of Professor, after more than forty years of service.

Anne Glass' selflessness and genuine concern for the "total person" and for music in Clarksville helped local musicians, audiences, and church goers of all ages in all stages to thrive. We are deeply grateful that she shared her gifts with our community generously and loyally. She is greatly missed.

THE CLARKSVILLE COMMUNITY CONCERT ASSOCIATION

The Clarksville Community Concert Association (CCCA) brings music performances of high artistic merit to Clarksville-Montgomery County and promotes interest in and enjoyment of live music concerts through community outreach and education. The CCCA has presented a local concert series annually since 1951. Grants, donations, membership subscriptions, and single ticket sales make the efforts of the CCCA possible, fostering this important work in our community.
