Active versus Passive Voice

Active Voice

- Active sentences are more precise and concise than passive sentences because they explicitly identify the actor acting and follow English's typical word order: subject, verb, and object.
- Subject + Action + Object = Active Voice

How to tell if a sentence is written in an active voice

- The subject performs the action expressed by the verb.
 - "The cat (subject) chased (verb) the mouse (object)."
 - "She (subject) baked (verb) a delicious cake (object)."

Active Examples

- "The chef prepared the meal."
- "I wrote the report."
- "They built the bridge."

Passive Voice

- Writers use the passive voice to enhance cohesion, shift focus, or avoid excessive separation between subject and verb.
- Object + Action + Subject = Passive Voice

How to tell if a sentence is written in passive voice

- The subject receives the action rather than performing it.
 - "The mouse (subject) was chased (passive verb) by the cat."
- A form of the verb "to be" (e.g., was, is, will be, can, had been) is followed by a past participle (e.g., baked, reviewed, written, cleaned, discussed).
 - The cake was baked by Mary.
 - The document **is** being reviewed by the committee.
 - The novel was written by a famous author.
- Look for "by" phrases
 - The speech was delivered **by** the president.
 - The report was written by the team.
- Look for "have/has" and "will"
 - The experiment **has been conducted** by the research team.
 - The data **have been analyzed** by the statisticians.
 - The manuscript **will be reviewed** by the editorial board.

Passive Examples

- "The meal was prepared by the chef."
- "The report was written by me."
- "The bridge was built by them."

Active versus Passive Voice

How to Write an Academic Paper

Active Voice

- Use active voice to emphasize the subject acting, making your writing more direct and engaging.
- The active voice often works well for clear, straightforward statements, especially in scientific or technical writing.

Active Examples

- "The study **examined** the effects of climate change on biodiversity."
- "The researcher **conducted** interviews with participants to gather data."
- "The team **analyzed** the results and drew conclusions based on the findings."
- "The author **argued** that socioeconomic factors influence educational outcomes."
- "The professor **presented** the findings at the conference."

Passive Voice

- Use passive voice to emphasize the action, the object receiving it, or de-emphasize the subject.
- Passive voice is often used when the subject is unknown, less critical, or focused on the action rather than the doer.

Passive Examples

- "The effects of climate change on biodiversity were examined in the study."
- "Data were gathered through interviews conducted with participants by the researcher."
- "Results were analyzed and conclusions were drawn based on the findings by the team."
- "It was argued that educational outcomes are influenced by socioeconomic factors."
- "The findings were presented at the conference by the professor."
