Breach and Breech

| Word | breach | breech |
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| Definition | (n) a broken, ruptured, or torn condition or area (n) a violation of a law, duty, or agreement. (v) to make a gap in something | • (n) short pants covering the hips and thighs |

Breach is a noun that refers to a violation of a rule, law, or agreement, or a gap or break in a barrier. As a verb, it means to break or violate.

- Noun Example: The security **breach** exposed sensitive student information.
- Verb Example: Hackers attempted to **breach** the university's online database.

Breech is a noun that refers to the back part of a firearm or the lower rear part of something, such as an animal or the human body.

- Example: The museum guide pointed out the **breech** mechanism on the old ceremonial firearm.
- Example: The antique cannon was loaded through the **breech** during the historical reenactment.

Beside vs Besides

| Word | beside | besides |
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| Definition | • (preposition) next to or at the side of something or someone | (preposition) in addition to or apart from (adverb) moreover; also |

Beside is a preposition that means next to or at the side of something or someone.

- Example: She placed her notebook **beside** the textbook on the desk.
- Example: The dog sat quietly **beside** its owner during class.
- Example: There's an empty chair **beside** me if you'd like to sit here.

Besides is a preoposition that means in addition to or apart from. It is also an adverb that means moreover or also.

- Preposition Example: **Besides** math, she excels in science and history.
- Preposition Example: No one was at the party **besides** her close friends.
- Adverb Example: The library is the best study spot. **Besides**, it's quiet and comfortable.
- Adverb Example: I'm too busy to go out tonight. **Besides**, it's raining.
