

Capitalization

General Capitalization Rules

- Capitalize proper nouns (specific people, places, and things).
- Do not capitalize common nouns (*general* people, places, and things).
- Always capitalize the first word in every sentence.
 - Example: The dog ran across the garden.

Abbreviations

- Capitalize abbreviations and acronyms for organizations, agencies, associations, countries, states,
 provinces, academic degrees, and professional designations.
 - Examples: FBI, NBA

Geographic Locations

- Capitalize continents, countries, regions, cities, and towns.
 - **Examples:** The United States, the South
- Capitalize directional words only when referring to a specific region, not direction.
 - Examples: The South, go south, West, go west

Computers

- Capitalize the names of computer programs, keys, and menu items.
 - Examples: Microsoft Word, Google Chrome

Degrees

- Capitalize abbreviations of academic degrees and professional designations.
 - Examples: Jane Doe, PhD; David Smith, M.D.
- Do not capitalize when spelled out.
 - **Examples:** master's degree, doctor of dental surgery



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Directions

- Capitalize when indicating a region.
 - Example: The Western Hemisphere
- Do not capitalize when giving directions.
 - Examples: go south, head east

Family Titles

- Capitalize when used as a name or direct address.
 - Examples: Mom, Uncle Bill, Cousin Ellie
- Do not capitalize when paired with a possessive pronoun.
 - Examples: my niece, your aunt, your uncle

Historical Periods and Events

- Capitalize names of historical eras, movements, and events.
 - Examples: The Roaring Twenties, The Great Awakening

Geographical Features

- Capitalize names of specific natural landmarks.
 - **Examples:** The Rocky Mountains, Death Valley

Landmarks

- Capitalize names of buildings, monuments, parks, schools, and other notable places.
 - **Examples:** Austin Peay State University, Golden Gate Bridge



Capitalization

Government and Military

- Capitalize when referring to specific entities.
 - Examples: The United States Government, Central Intelligence Agency
- Capitalize **Administration**, **Cabinet**, and **Federal** when referring to specific bodies.
 - Examples: The Bush Administration, the President's Cabinet
- Capitalize **Nation** or **Republic** when substituting for a country's name.
 - **Examples:** The Nation stands united.
- Capitalize names of official courts.
 - Examples: The Supreme Court, Court of Appeals
- Do not capitalize generic systems of government or lower courts.
 - Examples: democratic republic, city court

Names of Persons

- Capitalize names of individuals and nicknames.
 - Examples: John Jacob Doe, Richard the Lionhearted
- Capitalize words derived from personal names.
 - Examples: Marxism, Keynesian economics
- Capitalize prepositions and articles in names only when not preceded by a first name or title.
 - Examples: Van Leeuwen, Thomas van Leeuwen



Capitalization

Personal Titles

- Capitalize academic, religious, government, and honorary titles when used before a name or as a direct address.
 - Examples: Professor Smith, Reverend Johnson, "Hello, Officer"
- Do not capitalize when used generically.
 - **Examples:** "The doctor is in" or "I hope to be president".
- Do not capitalize former, ex-, or -elect.
 - Example: former President George Bush

Planets

- Capitalize names of planets, stars, and celestial bodies.
 - Examples: Mercury, Venus, Earth

Race, Ethnicity, Nationality, and Language

- Capitalize all names of races, ethnicities, nationalities, and related languages.
 - Examples: Canadian, Asian, Spanish

Religion

- Capitalize names of religions, sects, and derived terms.
 - Examples: Islam, Buddhism, Christianization
- Capitalize sacred books, versions, and sections.
 - **Examples**: Holy Bible, Koran
- Capitalize names of religious creeds, traditions, and deities.
 - Examples: The Lord's Supper, the Four Noble Truths, God, Buddha



Capitalization

Thoroughfares

- Capitalize names of streets, highways, and interstates.
 - **Examples:** Madison Street, Interstate 40

Time and Date

- Capitalize days, months, and holidays.
 - Examples: Monday, September, Christmas Day
- Do not capitalize: seasons, a.m., p.m., noon, or midnight.
 - Examples: spring, winter, noon

Titles of Works

- Capitalize main words in titles of books, films, songs, and artworks.
 - **Examples:** The Scarlet Letter, The Wedding March
- Do not capitalize short articles, prepositions, or conjunctions unless first or last in the title.
 - **Examples:** The Woman in Black, The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe

Organizations

- Capitalize names of official groups, associations, and institutions.
 - Examples: The American Cancer Society, Student Government Association
