# **Subject-verb Agreement**

Subject-verb agreement means the verb must agree with the subject in number (singular or plural).

# **General Rule**

- If the **subject** ends in -s, the verb does not.
- If the **verb** ends in -s, the subject does not.
  - Example: They write essays. (Plural subject, verb does not end in -s)
  - **Example:** She writes essays. (Singular subject, verb ends in -s)

# When the Subject Follows the Verb

- Be careful that begin with **there is** or **there are**.
  - Example: There is an open appointment at the Writing Center.
  - **Example:** There **are** many students waiting for feedback.

# **Indefinite Pronouns as Subjects**

- Certain indefinite pronouns always require singular verbs: all, any, everybody, each, either, neither, nobody, none, more, most, somebody, etc.
  - **Example:** Everyone **needs** to schedule an appointment early.
- Other indefinite pronouns can be either singular or plural, depending on the context:
  - Example: Some of the feedback is helpful. (singular)
  - **Example:** Some of the students **are** improving their writing. (plural)

# **Compound Subjects**

- Two or more nouns or pronouns connected by **and** usually take a plural verb.
  - **Example:** The tutor and the student **discuss** the essay together.



Subject-Verb Agreement

# **Compound Subjects**

- If the compound subject acts as a single unit, it uses a singular verb.
  - **Example:** Time and effort **is** required to write a strong paper.
- Two or more singular nouns or pronouns joined by **or** or **nor**, the verb agrees with the closest noun.
  - **Example:** Neither the professor nor the students want to reschedule the session.
  - **Example:** Neither the students nor the professor wants to reschedule the session.

#### **Collective Nouns & Titles**

- Singular when viewed as a single unit.
  - **Example:** The Writing Center staff **is** available to help.
- Plural when referring to individual members.
  - Example: The Writing Center staff are sharing different tutoring strategies.
- Titles of works, companies, and gerund phrases take singular verbs.
  - **Example:** Effective Writing Strategies **helps** students improve.

# Special Verbs & Irregular Forms

- Third-person singular subjects take an -s ending in the present tense.
  - **Example:** The tutor reviews papers. (singular)
  - **Example:** The tutors review papers. (plural)
- To be and to have change based on the subject:
  - Example: She is, they are.
  - **Example:** He has, they have.



Subject-Verb Agreement

- Modal verbs (can, must, should) always use the base form.
  - Example: She must schedule an appointment. (not "must schedules")

# **Tricky Sentence Structures**

- Ignore phrases between the subject and the verb.
  - **Example:** The feedback from the tutors helps students improve.
- When the order is reversed, identify the subject carefully
  - Example: In the Writing Center works an experienced tutor. (not "work")

#### Answers

- **group** is a singular collective noun → is
- each is singular  $\rightarrow$  was
- For **neither...nor**, the verb agrees with the noun closest to it  $\rightarrow$  want
- **Academic writing** is singular → is
- Committee is a singular collective noun → has
