The Thesis Statement

A **thesis statement** is typically a single sentence that serves as the foundation of your academic writing. It presents the main argument to your reader and justifies the necessity of your paper.

A Thesis Should:

- Summarize the main point or claim of an essay or research paper
- Clearly indicate what the paper will discuss and the author's stance
- Concisely express the main idea of the paper
- Justify the discussion and take a clear stand or position
- Be supported and proven with evidence in the body paragraphs

A Thesis Should Not:

Some professors may require the thesis to pose a question or include a specific signal phrase as part of the assignment. Always consult your assignment sheet.

- Ask a question instead of making a claim
- Simply state a fact
- Include abbreviations or overly generic language
- Use vague or introductory phrases such as:
 - "This paper will discuss..."
 - "I am going to prove that..."

Writing Tips

- Freewrite for 10 minutes about your topic to brainstorm ideas.
- Organize your ideas into main points.
- Take a stance that directly answers the assignment prompt.
- Your thesis should present ideas that require explanation or defense, giving readers a reason to keep reading.

How to Develop a Thesis Statement

Pose a Question

- Restate the question or prompt in your own words.
 - **Example:** What are the primary causes of climate change?

Make a Claim

- Answer the question with your opinion or stance (without using "I").
 - **Example:** Climate change is caused primarily by human activities.

Identify Your Main Points

- Write down three key reasons or pieces of evidence that support your claim. These will become your topic sentences for each body paragraph.
 - **Example 1:** The burning of fossil fuels, such as coal and oil, releases carbon pollution into the atmosphere.
 - **Example 2:** Deforestation means fewer trees exist to absorb carbon dioxide and release oxygen into the air.
 - **Example 3:** Farming contributes to climate change because livestock produce methane, a greenhouse gas.

Put Your Ideas All Together

- Put your question, claims, and main points all together into a thesis statement.
 - **Example Thesis:** Climate change is caused by human activities, such as the burning of fossil fuels, deforestation, and farming.
 - **Example Thesis:** The Writing Center benefits students through online resources by providing YouTube educational videos, writing handouts, and virtual appointments, which in turn support commuter students.
