Active vs. Passive Voice

Active Voice

- Active sentences clearly show **who is doing the action**.
- They are usually more direct, concise, and easier to read.
 - **Sentence Order:** Subject + Action + Object = Active Voice

How to Identify Active Voice

- The subject **performs** the action expressed by the verb.
 - **Example:** The cat chased the mouse.
 - The cat (subject) chased (verb) the mouse (object).
 - **Example:** She baked a delicious cake.
 - She (subject) baked (verb) a delicious cake (object).

Practice Identifying Sentence Parts

- What is the subject, verb/action, and object?
 - **Example:** The study examined the effects of climate change on biodiversity.
 - **Example:** The team analyzed the results and drew conclusions based on the findings.
 - **Example:** They built the bridge.

Writing Tips

- Use active voice to emphasize the subject acting. This makes the writing more direct and engaging.
- Works well for clear, straightforward statements, especially in scientific or technical writing.

Active versus Passive Voice

Passive Voice

- Passive sentences focus on the **action** or the **object receiving the action**, instead of who performs it.
 - **Sentence Order: Object + Verb + (by Subject) = Passive Voice**

How to Identify Passive Voice

- The subject **receives** the action rather than performing it.
 - **Example:** The mouse was chased by the cat.
 - The mouse (subject) was chased (passive verb) by the cat.
- Passive verbs use a form of “**to be**” (was, is, has been, will be) and a **past participle**.
 - **Example:** The document is being reviewed by the committee.
 - **Example:** The cake was baked by Mary.

Tips for finding Passive Voice

- Look for “**by**” phrases.
 - **Example:** The report was written **by** the team.
- Look for verbs like **has/have been, will be, is/was** followed by a past participle.
 - **Example:** The manuscript **will be** reviewed **by** the editorial board.

Practice Identifying Sentence Parts

- What is the object, passive verb, and subject receiving?
 - **Example:** The effects of climate change on biodiversity were examined in the study.
 - **Example:** The findings were presented at the conference by the professor.

Writing Tips

- Use passive voice to emphasize the action or the object receiving it.
- Useful when the subject is unknown, less critical, or the focus is on the action.
